

2oz S.R.flour


3.5 oz sugar

METHOD

Cream fat, sugar with lemon rind and juice. Add beaten egg yolks. Stir in, alternately, milk and sifted flour. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites, lightly but thoroughly. Bake 40m Gas - 350 deg until pud is golden brown and well risen. Surprise sauce under sponge topping!

Are we really saying we can do nothing?


Should we not constantly remind the young people responsible that we do care!

Interview with Jean Davis

Jean Davis came to live in Hexthorpe about ten years ago after many years in Sabah, Malaysia, on the island of Borneo.



Why did you return to England Jean?

I came back to nurse my mother who was becoming very ill. We both settled in Hexthorpe, and my mother died in 1988.

What used to be your work in Sabah, Jean?

I was working with the Christian churches in Sabah and my main responsibility was to help with the translation of the New Testament into the language of the people there.

What language was it?

It is called the Tagal language spoken by the Tagal people of Sabah. There are a number of dialects of the language. The Tagal people are basically subsistence farmers who spend a lot of their time on their rice farms apart from one or two cash crops they have such as pepper.

Did you enjoy life there?

Very much. Their life would be regarded by many in the west as backward or even primitive. It is certainly undeveloped though changes are coming very quickly now, but there is an atmosphere, a charm and simplicity in their style of life that very much appeals to me. That's perhaps why I like spending a lot of my spare time here on my allotment.

Was the translation work completed?

There has been a previous translation of parts of the New Testament. My initial task was to translate the part that remained (quite a substantial part) and also parts of the Old Testament. I was able to do this through quite a lot of the checking and tidying up was done in this country through correspondence with Tagal helpers. In the end in 1987 the Bible Society produced a rather unique version of the New Testament, combining the parts of the old translation with the parts I had translated in a more modern style.

It must have been a great thrill to see the end product?

It was indeed. I shall not forget the day the postman delivered my copy of the Tagal New Testament to my home in Gladstone Road. Though my great concern then was that it should be adequately circulated and used among the Tagal churches.

Why was there any doubt about this?

Well, because in the past the churches have used the Bible in the national language of Malaysia. Some are more skilled in it than others. But it is always best to read the Bible in your mother tongue, the language of the heart.

I was aware some might look down on using their own language and thus lose the prestige associated with using the national language well.

And what has happened?

One of the main purposes in going back for a six month visit last year was to see whether the new translation was being used. I was very relieved and pleased to find many well-worn, well-thumbed copies of the new book as evidence that it was being used, contrary to my fears. It made all the years of effort seem so worthwhile.
