# Sonny Shares in Dons Triumph

Sonny Wakarau, one of the stars of the Dons, is a Hexthorpe man. Sonny, Corina and their lovely daughter Kaysha, who is not yet 1 year old, live on Urban Road. Although Sonny and Corina were born and grew up in Wellington, New Zealand, they feel very much at home here.

"Doncaster is just about the right size. We lived in Leeds for a time, but that is too big", Sonny said. The people here, and especially the local people in Hexthorpe, are very friendly. The facilities, such as the Dome, are excellent."

It is hard to imagine that Sonny, the family man holding his young daughter in his own lounge, is one of the outstanding forwards in the Doncaster Rugby League Team. Dons have had a record breaking season and have won promotion to the First Division. Rugby League is hard, fast, physical and skilful

game and Sonny is a fearless tackler and runner, who has made many important breaks in setting up tries.

He thinks that the English season is too long, for the game is very demanding on the body. He used to play 'back to back' rugby - that is play in the New Zealand season, come over here and play in our season, and so on. He found that a

break is needed, as others have also found.

Sonny, who is now 28 years old, started his rugby career in Wellington. Rugby Union is the national game of New Zealand but at 19 he says that he 'saw the light', and became a Rugby League player for a local club Upper Hulf. He

soon played represent -ative rugby, as he was chosen for Wellington and then the New Zealand Maoris. It can't be too long before he plays for the New Zealand National team; next season in the First Division should give him his big chance.

He came to England to play for Batley in the 1989-90 season, and has played for Bramley in 1990-91 and 1992-93. He came to the Dons at the beginning of this season and has become a firm favourite with the crowd. The family are

become a firm favourite with the crowd. The family are going to New Zealand for a month or so at the end of May, but will be back for the new season. We hope that they will return to Doncaster and that Sonny will be playing for the Dons again next season. Sonny, Corina and Kaysha are always welcome here in Hexthorpe.



# The Labour Candidates Win Again

The two Labour candidates won the recent election in the Central Ward. Charles Harrison was re-elected and



a new councillor Tony Pratt replaces George Brumwell. Tony Pratt has lived in the Central Ward all his life and has been an active school governor for over 12 years at the Balby Carr School and the Balby Middle School. He has been interested in the welfare of young people, showing this by being Scout Leader of the St.John's

Scout Troop. Over the last 18 years he has been employed by the West Riding, South Yorkshire and Doncaster Metropolitan Borough Councils.

It is interesting to note that one Labour Candidate received 400 votes more than the other, and that one Liberal Democrat considerably more than the other. It has been said that perhaps some people were confused and voted for only one candidate (although three people voted for more than 2), or perhaps some voted across party lines.


The Youth Club has now been rewired and is back in use, hopefully it will soon be redecorated.

# Crime Prevention




I've been asked to pen a few words on Crime prevention for your newsletter. I can't say too much in a short space but let's try and get the most important facts over to you.

In the Doncaster area we have three dedicated crime prevention Officers namely Terry Magrs, John Abbott and George Potchworth. We are based at Rossington but cover the whole of the Doncaster M.B.C. area. If you need us the telephone has an answering machine as we're out and about a lot. The number is Doncaster 863434. Our advice and services are free.

If you are unfortunate enough to have been burgled then you should have received the Crime Prevention Handbook and a letter telling you where to get advice from. Please remember to pass the handbook on to a neighbour when you have read it because they will be worried about your burglary. If you need advice on general locks and bolts then your community constable has been given training and he will advise you. If, however, you are thinking about a Burglar Alarm then you need to speak with us. We can post you a simple to use brochure on how to select an alarm and also furnish you with a list of recognised alarm installers. Quite often this means we do not have to make a visit but can still get the information to you quickly.

I am hoping to do a series of crime prevention articles in the local papers over the coming months and I'll talk

about all different subjects. One of the biggest tips I can give you is this. Most burglars are opportunist. It usually takes minutes to be in your house, steal and out again. Honestly how many times do you nip out to the shops, or a friends just next door and leave the

# Plan for your Pets at Holiday Time

A change is as good as a rest and we all look forward to to a holiday - but if you are going away this year make sure it isn't a time of trauma for your pets.

Plan your pet's holiday well in advance. Boarding establishments get booked up early. Do not rely only on recommendations - inspects the pet's temporary home for yourself! Make sure the kennel or cattery of your choice is registered and licensed and above all shop around! Limited accommodation for small animals is available locally - call our Pet Helpline for details. (See below) Help us to make your pet as comfortable and happy as possible by giving details of its diet and meal times. Take along its own basket, food dishes etc., and/or favourite toy. Leave the name and number of your vet - and make guite clear what your instructions are . . . . you may not wish to come home to a huge vet bill!


Many animals will fret when their owners are away and they are in strange surroundings. A good idea is


to leave your pet with a reliable friend - particularly one that the animal knows. Better still, get the friend to live in. This will keep your pet happy and have your home looked after as well! Leave very clear and detailed instructions on how you want your animal(s) looked after. The friend should set aside periods for feeding, cleaning, companionship and - in the case of dogs particularly - exercising every day.

If you dog is going away with you by car, take plenty of fresh water for the journey and do not feed immediately before setting off. Stop very frequently to allow the dog to stretch its legs and relieve itself or it will suffer varying degrees of stress. While on holiday make sure your animal wears a disc with the temporary address on it as well as the normal one!

# The Thirteen Shops on Hexthorpe Lane

With their gently curving frontage the shops built about 1900 made a very pleasing approach to this rapidly expanding residential area. Planning permission was granted to Messrs H. Arnold & Sons in the summer of 1899. By June 1902 when Doncaster Transport Department were ready to operate trams the shops were already completed. the first one No. 19 was a fish and chip shop, 21 and 23 were run by Millard & Co Pawnbrokers and 25 was a sweet shop.

In the late 1950's the shops were renumbered 37 to 61 as on demolition of Bridge Terrace Hexthorpe Road 'moved' towards St James Bridge. They were occupied as follows:

19/37 Rogerson

23/41 Kateria, Watch Maker

25/43 E.L.Ibbitson, Hardware

27/45 E.Darringwater, Grocer

29/47 T.Ronan, Butcher

31/49 Batty, Commissions Agent

35/53 H.J.Frost, Stationary and Fancy Goods

37/55 F.Whiteley, Boot and Shoe Repairer

39/57 Petch, Fruiterer

43/61 Smith, Greengrocer

By 1977 the end was near for this block. Amongst the last occupants were Whiteley Boot and Shoe repairers and L.Ogilvie at 43/61 Greengrocers. By early 1978 the block has been cleared for the construction of the new Urban Road.



# Mentenary



# St Jude's Church, Hexthorpe



In the 1880's Anglican services were held in houses in the rapidly growing area of Hexthorpe around the Plant Works and railway. These houses were outgrown and in 1874 the School Hall was built, this later became the Church Hall and was knocked down in 1976 to make way for the through road from Urban Road to Shadyside.

In 1883 it was proposed to build a Church for Hexthorpe on land given by Mr. Pybus with donations from Lord Grimthorpe and his sister, Miss Beckett Denison.

The builder was Mr. Anelay who estimated a price of £4,320, this eventually came to £4,500.

The Church was opened on Saturday 2nd June 1884 by the Bishop of Beverley, the next important landmark was 17th July 1900 when the Church was Consecrated by the Archbishop of York, Later that year the Parish of St Jude, Hexthorpe was formed taking part of the Parish of St James from St James Bridge

to Gladstone Road with Rev. Pauling becoming the first Vicar. Prior to this date the Church had been a Chapel-of-ease and part of St James. In December 1930 the rest of Hexthorpe was removed from th Parish of St John, Balby and placed in the Parish of St Jude. After 1930 there were no further alterations to the boundaries until 1993 when the Railway works and station were included in the Parish.

> Additions to the original building took place in 1910 when the end door were blocked up and the Porch built, with the Chancel being added at the same time. In 1922 the lighting was changed from gas to electricity and in 1925 the Vestries added. Except for the building of the new Church Hall the exterior of the Church has changed very little.

> > Inside alterations have been made as forms of worship have changed, the original organ installed in 1901 has been replaced and the Choir stalls have disappeared.

#### Changes Today

This brings us up to the present; to stem many of the rumours circulating in Hexthorpe we would like to reassure people that although a lot of members of the Church of England, including a good proportion of those at St Judes, find themselves unable to accept the changes being wrought in the Church, those people are to leave to find a Spiritual Home elsewhere and we wish them all the best for the future as we part in Love. Those who remain have been promised by the Bishop that a male Priest will be appointed to the Parish very soon, although not in time to celebrate our Centenary with us. This does not stop us making this a year of exciting events to which all the Parish are invited. Please support our efforts as due to the drop in numbers our financial state will cause problems in the near future, besides which we want you to feel part of our Centenary.


