The event was organised by HEAF, the Environmental Action Forum. The mayor of Doncaster, Mrs Mitchinson, attended along with Mike Cooper and other members of the Leisure Services, Sue Daynes of the Environment Service, PC Hartshorne the local community policeman, two Hexthorpe councillors, Charles Harrison and Gordon Jones, members of HEAF and interested local people.

However, the most important people there were the children from Hexthorpe School. They all put a spadeful of soil into the

roots of the tree as it was being planted.
During the morning PC Hartshorn and
members of HEAF talked to the children in
the school. The object was to make the
children aware of and proud of their
environment.

One of the aims of HEAF is to "maintain, repair, restore, preserve, and improve, beautify and reconstruct the environment of Hexthorpe for the benefit of the inhabitants of the community". It is hoped that through the formation of this group, funds will be made available to achieve such an objective. Members of HEAF emphasise that if the work is to be successful all members of the community will need to have an awareness of their environment.

The chairperson of the group is Mrs A Nightingale and the secretary is Mr R Baker. Meetings are held in the Youth Centre on Shadyside at 7 pm on the first Thursday of the month.

Marshmallow Roll

A quick and easy tea-time treat requiring no cooking. You need:

- 1 small tin (6.91 fl.oz/196 grms) condensed milk
- 1/4 cup desiccated coconut.


Method

The Plant Fire

Dear Hexpress

The 20th December, 1940, was my 30th birthday. I was married with two children, Jean 7, and Barbara 5. My husband, Cliff, worked at the Plant, as a Trimmer, and when the fire broke out he went to see if he could do anything, but there were already enough people helping.

We lived in Dennison Road and the back-yard was so brightly lit up by the fire that you could see to pick a pin up, and sparks were flying everywhere. Although we had a shelter in the garden, we daren't stay there so, even though Jean had measles, we wrapped her in a blanket and set off to a relative's house at the top of Urban Road. On the way up we could hear bombs falling. Some fell on Shadyside, and one blew a manhole cover out, near the old beer-off, but most failed to explode and were dismantled later.

When we reached the top of Urban Road, we decided it wasn't safe enough to stay in a house, so we made for the community shelter on the Flatts. It was built where the swings used to be (and maybe still are). Underground it was made of tunnels, like passages, and everyone sat facing each other, on wooden seats made out of planks. It was cold and damp, and of course, we had nothing to eat or drink. After nine hours Mr Battersby, who was in charge of the shelter, told us that it was safe to go back home.

Healthy Living at Hexthorpe School

For two weeks in March our children in Hexthorpe replaced chocolate, crisps and biscuits with fruit and vegetables. A healthy tuck shop was open each day. Children were able to purchase healthy food to be eaten during the morning break.

They were also able to sample other healthy food cooked in school by the children themselves.

This was part of health promotion activities which the school organised. There was a full range of activities and meetings which children and parents attended. Talks on head lice, asthma, disability awareness and sun protection were arranged especially for parents.

For the children the events included talks on drugs, keep-fit groups, Irish dancing, story telling, and activities arranged by the Doncaster Association for Sport and Health. The keep-fit sessions and talks on drugs were

given by P C Bill McCormack, (Schools Liaison Officer) and P C Peter Hartshorne (Community Police Officer).

Mrs Catherine Lawson the head teacher said "the aims of the activities include raising awareness about aspects of health and fitness through participation in physical activity and exercise; involving children in the cooking and tasting of healthy foods; giving children information about drugs and solvent abuse; discussing aspects of personal safety; working on strategies for developing confidence, self-esteem and relationships and raising awareness about disability issues.

These activities were also part of the European Education Project which focused on aspects of health. We were delighted to be able to welcome some members of staff from our European partner schools in Italy and Ireland".

Did you know?

Many people will remember the famous Nuttall Mintoes. How many know that the firm of William Nuttall was first established in Hexthorpe? The 1891 census returns state that at "19 Bridge Street, Hexthorpe, lived William Nuttall, head confectioner and grocer, his wife Sarah Ann, son Henry Thomas and daughter Anne Elizabeth".

It was in 1884 that William Nuttall opened a little shop in Bridge Street. His home made sweets, boiled in the family copper, made him a living. They were sold in his small shop and on market stalls. In 1903 he bought a derelict business in Chapel Street and took on a staff of six.

He was later assisted by his son. They experimented with mint-flavoured sweets and eventually produced the Mintoe. Hard work and a good quality product had their reward and in 1909 the firm built a model factory in Athron Street and the staff topped the one hundred mark. The rest is history. Do you know where Bridge Street and Chapel Street were? Do you know of what permanent reminder of the Nuttall family there still is in Doncaster?

Help is desperately needed!

The Artis Pet Sanctuary in Balby, Doncaster, is looking for fundraising projects to help with its animal welfare work.

The award winning sanctuary currently undergoing renovation at its new premises - is dedicated to the care, welfare, rescue and rehabilitation of small pet and wild animals.

Experts from the Weston Road rescue centre regularly visit schools, voluntary organisations and so on, giving talks highlighting their work and their other main concern of responsible pet ownership. These visits, mainly to groups of children and illustrated with some of the resident Artis animals, are undertaken free. Adult and specialist groups are also visited. It is also hoped that groups will be able to visit the sanctuary itself once the new Education Centre there is completed this year.

Gerald Coley, speaking on behalf of Artis says, "As a charity, we rely entirely on donations to keep the many aspects of our animal care work going. We are urging all animal lovers to get their thinking caps on to dream up ways to raise money, which the sanctuary desperately needs. Last year we did extremely well with fundraising by lots of people, from youngsters to senior citizens, but this year we need to do even better!"

Hexthorpe Tenants and Residents Association

Being a representative for Hexthorpe in general as well as for the Junction I get into guite a few meetings with the Council, businesses, and other agencies. They are mainly to do with regeneration, and Hexthorpe is more in these agendas due to a lot of hard work by those that are really active within Hexthorpe. We need to get more involved in the things that affect us here in Hexthorpe and the town in general.

Things are changing; I know that attitudes are changing within the local council as well as its workers. They have seen the light as far as having to work more closely with communities is concerned. Now we have a more level playing field how many of us are going to be brave enough to get involved?

I'm doing my bit by shouting out for Hexthorpe interests at these meetings, and so are one or two others; so support us where you can by coming to one of the existing meetings like the Tenants and Residents Association on the third Thursday of each month at 7 pm. They are held at Hexthorpe Primary School.

The speaker for the April meeting is Pam Horner from South Yorkshire Passenger Transport; so if you have any problems or questions about public transport this is the meeting to attend.

If you are interested in the environmental group they meet at the Youth Centre on Shadyside, the first Thursday of each month 7 pm. If you are interested in the Hexthorpe Gala group, they meet at Eden Grove every three to four weeks; just ask me if you want to know about the next one.

Phillip Yates

We are sad to report the death of Philip Yates. He was highlighted in one of our previous editions. He was one of eight men who won the Edward Medal (later the George Cross) in the disaster at Bentley colliery. He was the last survivor of a group who, regardless of their own safety, displayed great gallantry in rescuing injured men. There has been an obituary and photograph in the Times newspaper. Mr Yates, who lived in Old Hexthorpe, is survived by his wife Mary and a son and daughter.

Mainline Spokesman at Tenants Meeting

At the March Tenants and Residents Association Mr Ashworth from Mainline answered questions concerning the bus services. Here are some of them with the response of Mr Ashworth. Why not a bus to link Hexthorpe with the Greenfield Lane surgery? A service has to be commercially viable. There may be a social need but in the end the priority of the bus company is to make a profit. It is highly unlikely that such a service would be provided.

Questions were asked conserving the bus stops in Duke Street and St Sepulchre Gate. Mainline is aware of the problem. The moving of the Hexthorpe terminus to Duke Street could be a possibility, but no promise was made.

Why is the Hexthorpe fare so expensive? Mainline fixes the prices. The Hexthorpe route is on Normal Fare Scales, some routes are on a cheaper rate: no real explanation was given.

Mr Ashworth was thanked for being prepared to answer questions. He said that if any one had any questions or complaints then please let Mainline know.

The Bridge on the Flatts

A question was asked at the Tenants and Residents meeting concerning the condition of the railway bridge in Oswin Avenue. Mr Charles Harrison said it was the responsibility of the Railway Company and the council was putting pressure on the company to put it in good order.

Band Concerts in the Dell

Three concerts have been arranged. 21st June and 23rd August – Armthorpe Band; 13 September – Markham Main Band. It is hoped that other concerts will be arranged.
