# **Local News From Lockdown**

### Letter from Glyn Jones, Councillor and Deputy Mayor Glyn Jones



The past 10 weeks have been incredibly hard for the people of Hexthorpe, Doncaster and the World. The global Coronavirus pandemic has sadly taken a significant toll in terms of life, health, well-being and wealth. For some, working from home has presented huge challenges; those socially isolating because of age or pre-existing conditions of themselves or a family member has been problematic and provided tough decisions for many and created issues over self-sufficiency, personal pride, mental-health and physical health.

It is difficult to offer face-to-face, direct contact, when social distancing rules apply for everyone in most, if not all, situations. However, despite relaxation of some hastily introduced Covid-19 legislation the original advice of 'Stay Safe' still applies, we must observe the 2-metre distancing regular handwashing and self-isolation if Covid-19 symptoms occur, the last thing we need is another spike in transmission rates leading to increased suffering and ultimately further loss of life.

Balby and Hexthorpe are among areas where breeching of the Covid-19 laws has been at its highest in Doncaster. Despite significant interventions by the Council, Police and other agencies behaviours such as fly-tipping and Anti-Social Behaviour remain (ASB), but the war on ASB, litter and flytipping continues, if evidence is found, there are consequences to face and offenders will be penalised.

Hexthorpe, has been greatly affected in many ways, but it is important to pay credit to the individuals and organisations that have engaged in reducing personal difficulties and hardship for residents within the Hexthorpe area.

We also need to acknowledge unsung heroes that have selflessly helped Family, Friends, Neighbours and Strangers when they have needed assistance, who often go un-noticed. We should also thank the NHS Staff and Carers who have placed their health and lives in potential danger whilst helping others.

Finally, I will offer and re-iterate the advice of Public Health England regarding Social Distancing 2-metres and regular Hand washing.

### A Hexthorpe Scrubs Workshop

# Co-ordinated from a workshop in Hexthorpe, hundreds of items including complete sets of scrubs are being sent out to nurses, care workers and dentists, all created by an industrious army of voluntary textile workers.

The hub in Hexthorpe takes in material, dishes out patterns to the team of volunteers. The volunteers then get to work either cutting out from the patterns or sewing them together. At the centre of this is Doncaster charity worker Kerry Burton.

"I would estimate that we have 150-200 sewing," said Kerry. "It's not just scrubs they're making. They're making washing bags that people can put their items in, scrub hats like surgeons wear, and head bands with buttons on them that they use to stop their ears getting sore from straps going around them."

### **Hexthorpe Volunteers**

Since the outbreak of the pandemic it has been wonderful to see how people have come together to support one another and to offer help when needed. In late March The King's Cross Church took the decision to offer a service to people in our local neighbourhoods. Many of the most vulnerable people in the Hexthorpe and Balby area received a leaflet from the church through their letter boxes offering a range of support.

To date we have helped thirty different individuals, most of whom we did not know before. For some of these we collect their shopping on a weekly basis; others need an occasional purchase, a letter posting or a prescription collecting. For others, receiving a friendly phone call on a regular basis is helping them to cope.

We are registered with the Council for food provision, and have also received a generous donation from the local councillors to help us with this work.

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Hanging on the fence and the tree at the school's main entrance were the children's Kind Heart Messages. Each child wrote a message or painted a picture on one of the hearts for people to read as they went on their daily walk.



Messages included: 'Be Happy', 'Stay Safe', 'Be Kind' and words of support to the NHS and all of our other key workers. Inside the plastic wallet were more hearts for the community to join in with the festival and spread the kindness further. Along with the rainbow chain, the display attracted lots of attention and positive comments from member of the public who passed school spreading the smiles, the support and the messages of kindness





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To continue with the theme, school has also been making a joke book to make people smile. A request for jokes was put on the school's blogs and Twitter. Some of the jokes included:

What's a pirate's favourite shop? ...... Aaaaargos!! I used to be addicted to soap, but I'm now clean! Someone stole my mood ring ... I don't know how I feel about that!

The jokes are being put together into a book and this will be shared on the school Blogs, Twitter and copies available in school for the children to enjoy. Hopefully it will spread lots of laughs and smiles.

Spreading the message further: To show their support for the staff and to help boost morale, pupils at Hexthorpe sent some pictures and art work to Doncaster Royal Infirmary.


As well as drawing and painting pictures, the children had great fun completing some large scale art on the school playground. They then posed for photos with their painted balloons making it look like they were being blown away by the wind. A member of staff's family member took the pictures into their work to Ward S12 at DRI. This is a message we have received from Ward S12: "This is fantastic. Please see attached a certificate for everyone involved." The children were so proud to receive their certificate and are proudly displaying it in their classroom.

The school continues to support families with food and clothing as well as mental health support. Every week, school staff put together food packages for families in need to make sure that all of our families have access to healthy, nutritious food - and the odd treat too.


We are sure that the whole of the Hexthorpe community awards them a 'big clap' - thank you!

# Pandemic Closes Hexthorpe School - 1918

### 'School is now closed this afternoon, by order of the Medical Officer'

That was the entry for the 8 November 1918 in the log book of the Hexthorpe Infant School. The entry in the Junior School log book states that it was closed for 8 weeks because of a flu outbreak. The schools reopened on 6 January 1919. During that time the first of several pupils died.



Having had to leave the school buildings on several occasions to make way for the military, the staff must have thought that they could now settle down. However, the order to close came just 3 days before the Armistice was signed. This was because of what became known as 'The Spanish Flu'.

The flu did not originate in Spain, but Spain was the first country to report deaths from it, leading to the assumption that it must have started there. Spain's newspapers were not subject to wartime censorship, because it was a neutral country. News of the epidemic was initially suppressed in other countries to avoid damaging morale.

By the end of the pandemic, the death toll in Britain was 228,000, and a quarter of the population are thought to have been infected what a way to end a war. Families who had already lost loved ones were now to experience it again. Mortality was particularly high

among the 20-40 years old.

With no vaccine to protect against influenza, control efforts against infection were limited to isolation, quarantine, good personal hygiene, use of disinfectants, and limitations of public gatherings.

Interestingly many pupils of the school during the 40's and 50's speak of going on the annual school journey to Derbyshire. They always mention the plague village of Eyam. The bubonic plague, rampant in London in 1665, was carried to this small village in some cloth delivered to the village tailor.

By November 1666, 260 villagers had died. Their fate had been sealed four months earlier when the entire village led by the vicar the Rev Mompesson, made the remarkable decision to quarantine itself in an attempt to halt the spread of the Great Plague. MOMPESSON'S WELL During the period of the Plague tod and medicines were brought here and cours left in the well in payment . Anegar was added to disinfect the coints

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Without the restraint of the villagers many more people,

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especially from neighbouring villages, would have more than likely died. The isolation was very effective.

It is quite remarkable that experts today still examine and learn from both terrible outbreaks of these deadly diseases.

# The Plans for 671 Homes in Hexthorpe Given the go Ahead by the Planners

The plan to build hundreds of homes on the old Plant Works site has been recommended for approval by the Doncaster Council planning officers. The final approval will have to come from elected councillors. There have been many false dawns but it does seem that this time it is for real.

The development will include 671 homes, a new drainage scheme, open spaces and pedestrian links along the River Don to a large open space. This space is to be located on the former Eden Grove Sports Ground.

There are 7 registered objections to the scheme. They included concern about the unattractive approach from town, a fear of more anti-social behaviour, a lack of shops and a pub and a fear of Eden Grove being turned into a busy thoroughfare.

The Free Press said that the plans are controversial. However, only seven objections to such a major scheme is thought to be light and many local people welcome the development - 'The situation can only get better' is a common theme. The Council members will have to weigh up the pros and cons and come to a final decision. The Bombardier site was first put up for sale 12 years ago in 2008!

Planning officer Andrea Suddes said:

"The proposal will redevelop a vacant, brownfield site for housing. Officers have identified no adverse economic, environmental or social harm that would significantly or demonstrably outweigh the benefits identified when considered against the policies in the Framework taken as a whole.

The proposal for housing is in line with the development plan, the forward direction of Doncaster's Local Plan and on a site that already benefits from a housing permission. The proposal will ensure Doncaster continues to deliver much needed housing in a sustainable location."
